Public hearing to consider the following ordinances amending Title 10 of the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances relating to Food Code, adding or deleting language to remove conflicts with Minnesota Statutes and Rules:

- a) Chapter 186 relating to In General;
- b) Chapter 188 relating to Administration and Licensing;
- c) Chapter 190 relating to Meat and Meat Products;
- d) Chapter 198 relating to Soft Drink Manufacture and Storage; and
- e) Chapter 200 relating to Milk and Dairy Products.

Background/Supporting Information Attached

The Minneapolis Code of Ordinances, Title 10 Food Code, Chapters 186 - In General and 188 - Administration and Licensing contain language that is in conflict with or redundant in Minnesota Statutes and Rules governing food safety. The public hearing authorizes deleting redundant definitions already in statute or rule, and minor deletions or additions to ensure the ordinance is not in conflict with state statute or rule and that all applicable statute and rules are properly referenced.

In addition, Minneapolis Code of Ordinances, Title 10 Food Code, Chapters 190 - Meat and Meat Products, 198 - Soft Drink Manufacture and Storage, and 200 - Milk and Dairy Products, contain language that is redundant in Minnesota Statutes and Rules. The public hearing authorizes striking all language in these chapters due to antiquated and redundant language.
