

Election Day registration errors

Election Day Registration (EDR) represents one of the most challenging tasks that election judges statewide contend with on Election Day. For this reason, errors are not uncommon.

The graph below shows the percentage of errors out of the total Election Day Registrations processed in Minneapolis voting precincts (including Ft. Snelling) for five common errors in four major elections.

As demonstrated, this graph shows that for four of the five errors considered, none of these occur at a rate above three percent in the four elections analyzed. Three of these four errors are in fact below two percent for this same time period. The outlier in this analysis is the 'Already Registered Same Name/Address' error, which has consistently occurred through these four major elections among over 6% of Election Day Registrations processed. During the 2014 Primary, this rate jumped even higher to just above 10%.

'Already Registered Same Name/Address' simply means that a voter completed a registration application and voted at the correct precinct when they were already registered and were listed on the Roster of Pre-registered Voters for that precinct. This can happen for a number of different reasons. For instance, some voters don't know that if they already have a valid Minnesota voter registration and then move and provide a permanent forwarding address to the United States Postal Service that their registration will be updated to their new address. If a voter then goes to their new polling place on Election Day without knowing their registration has already been updated for them, they may head straight for the Registration table. If this happens, the voter spends more time and effort in their polling place on Election Day than necessary to cast their vote. The positive side of the coin is that this error can easily be addressed through a combination of training and practice. As it is


of the utmost importance to make polling places as efficient as possible for the voting public, there will be heavy emphasis on this error during training in the future.

The table below details the number of Election Day Registration errors as a percentage of the total number of Election Day Registrations submitted. Five different types of errors and four major elections have been analyzed.



The number of voters who registered in the polls on Election Day in Minneapolis shown below was drastically different for the four elections considered. It is for this reason that, in order to compare the four elections in a useful way, the number of errors as a percentage of the total number of Election Day Registrations processed in each election is used for this analysis.

Looking at the 2014 General Election in particular, a comparison between Minneapolis and Hennepin County, as shown in the graph below, for the same five types of errors shows that Minneapolis nearly matches, or is below, the error rate for the whole of Hennepin County for four of those five errors. For only one, 'Voted out of Precinct,' Minneapolis was slightly higher by a margin of 0.27%.

For the 2014 General Election only ten voting precincts in all of Hennepin County were flawless with regard to the processing of the Election Day Registrations; **five** of those ten are Minneapolis precincts (including Ft. Snelling). In addition, 68 Minneapolis precincts were perfect as it pertains to the Roster of Pre-registered Voters. This 68 accounts for 224 (~30%) of the precincts in Hennepin County that were perfect in this category.

The ideal is to eliminate Pre-registered Roster and Election Day Registration mistakes entirely, but it is important to recognize that human errors can occur. For this reason, proper training and practice are of the utmost importance. Looking to the future, the Division seeks to enhance training in several ways. Among these, Elections & Voter Services plans to increase the time that election judges spend in training, diversify the way in which lessons are delivered (for example including more interactivity), create options for online training, provide self-assessments, and invest more time in practicing the processing of Election Day Registrations in particular. Finally, the Division will continue to pursue the use of e-poll books as another viable option to reduce errors and enhance voter service.
