











# KEY OBSERVATIONS

- We've taken an important step to round out our baseline by analyzing and aggregating all of the adopted Small Area Plan priorities into a unified underlying detailed framework.
- From this tighter network of local priorities, we will begin to surface a higher level major network.
- We've observed that there are pieces missing in the underlying neighborhood level policy. For instance, a lot of work has been done in the grid proper, but more purposeful attention to connectivity is needed on to the north and west, around Royalston and Van White, and to the east, around Cedar Riverside and the West Bank.
- Growth has expanded the sense of where downtown's "edges" are, and the framework should reflect that.

# PUBLIC REALM FRAMEWORK

## 1 - PHYSICAL FRAMEWORK

- **Physical framework** and priorities
- A **whole systems** plan that connects urban streets and plazas to the broader system of parks, trails and recreation
- Creation of **development and programming opportunities** that result in rich places supported by activities
- Define **near term, mid term and long term** implementation goals

# PUBLIC REALM FRAMEWORK

## 2- DEVELOPMENT GUIDELINES

- Incent or guide character and uses that will **enhance corridor or place identity**
  - Consider contributing potential of development program
  - Consider limitations or contributing potential of density
  - Ensure ease of activation where appropriate
  - Aspire to clarity/availability of resources or technical assistance
- Define **guidelines for development abutting priority public realm elements** and corridors, including consideration of ground floor uses, street wall characteristics, and potential for contribution to streetscape enhancement.







# COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

# COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

## *Downtown Service Area Master Plan*

### » Focus groups and stakeholder interviews

- Overall awareness of the project is still quite low
- There is a lot of desire for more/enhanced public spaces and parks in downtown
- If a sense of community and ownership emerges around places that are open to the homeless, then they will self-regulate/police more
- Public restrooms are very limited across downtown
- Small spaces serving specific needs (dogs, kids, etc.) can help fill needs where larger spaces can't be located
- The skyways are both an important part of winter life downtown and a detriment to street life in the summer
- Downtown businesses/property owners are interested in more places for people outdoors downtown but desire a degree of control over who can use them
- Recreation can be much broader

# COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

- Arts and events are a great draw to downtown, and can be a inconvenience to those living downtown
- Downtown is a critical hub for everyone using transit to get around (particularly youth, the disabled community, the poor) needs to work for getting through town as well as stopping and enjoying.
- Parks should be designed to feel more integrated with the surrounding community.
- A variety of types of seating—and more seating in general—is needed in downtown parks.
- Gathering spaces, and the rules for their use, should be designed to better suit the needs of the diverse community.
- Parks should celebrate their ecological and historical context.
- More opportunities for families to play are needed downtown.
- Parks and all public spaces designed to serve the most vulnerable in our population also better serve the entire community.
