City seeks election judges

With the Aug. 12 primary less than two weeks away, Minneapolis is still seeking election judges. Currently, over 1,000 people have agreed to serve as election judges for the primary. The Minneapolis Office of Elections & Voter Services estimates another 83 will be needed. In particular, judges who are fluent in a second language, including Somali, Hmong, and Spanish, are being sought. All election judges will take a two-hour training class.

Selection and placement of judges is based on applicant qualifications and party balance within the precinct. Preference will be given to those willing to serve a full day in a precinct with a vacancy. Neighborhood Stories: Universal Access Play Area opens at Wabun Picnic Area

Thursday, July 31 marked the grand opening and dedication of a new universal access play area at Minnehaha Falls Regional Park's Wabun Picnic Area. This is the first universally accessible play area in the Minneapolis park system.

A project of the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, the universal play area was supported by a variety of organizations and donors, including *Falls for All*, which raised over \$456,000 for the play area, and the Longfellow Community Council (LCC), which contributed toward the cost of accessible rubber surfacing to increase access for those using mobility aids. "Surfacing is one of the most effective ways to increase access, yet due to the expense, it is the easiest to cut from the budget," according to LCC's Executive Director Melanie Majors.

While all new play areas must meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements, a universally accessible play area vastly exceeds ADA requirements, with at least 70% of its play areas being accessible. Accessible features in the the new play area include rubberized surfaces, multiple ramps and paths to play within a structure, sensory- promoting features that encourage swinging, rocking, spinning and rolling, and quiet areas that provide for less intense experiences. The goal is to allow all children and their caregivers to be included in play.

Each session will focus on one aspect of City government such as public safety, public works, planning and development and fire services. Sessions will run from 6:30 to 9:00 PM. City approves open data policy

The Mayor and City Council have approved the City's first open data policy that sets in motion the creation of an open data portal so new kinds of City data can be accessed online by the public. Up until now, if residents or reporters wanted much of this information, they had to formally request it from the City.

Minneapolis now joins 38 states and 46 cities and counties that have open data portals that have made several hundred to thousands of data sets available to the public. By making the City of Minneapolis' data available online, the public can use it in a variety of ways, including to help identify efficient solutions for government, to promote innovative strategies for social progress and to create economic opportunities. Common uses of open data across the country include the development of web and smartphone applications such as applications that show when busses will arrive at a bus stop, where crime is happening, where public bikes are available and results of city inspections.

The approved policy states that a City open data portal will go live online by the end of the year. All data sets published on the open data portal will use a format that permits processing of the data for download through an application programming interface (API). City departments will work to make an initial set of data available when the portal comes online, and additional data sets will be added over time.

Beginning in 2015, all new City contracts will need to include provisions to ensure data sets can be made public when appropriate. City departments will also assign an open data coordinator to manage publishing departmental data. As part of the approval of the 2014 budget, the City Council directed staff to develop an open data policy for the city. The Information Technology department created the Open Data Group made up of department staff, Council Member Andrew Johnson, and subject matter experts from outside City government.

Absentee voting begins for August 12 primary

The City has begun accepting absentee ballots for the August 12, 2014 primary. Contests on the ballot in Minneapolis include federal, state, county, school board, and judicial offices. All Minneapolis voters are encouraged to vote in the primary and make their voice heard in selecting who will be the ballot in the November general election. This is the first time voters won't be required to provide a specific reason for not voting on primary day. That makes absentee voting available to all voters. Absentee voting for the Primary opened Friday, June 27 at the Minneapolis Office of Elections & Voter Services, 350 Fifth St. S. – Room 201.

Voters can choose to vote absentee either by mail or in person. City Hall has transformed into Minneapolis' largest polling place, open to all voters who want to come in to cast their absentee ballot in person. The Elections & Voter Services team has readied their office in room 201 to accommodate voters. They've also transitioned in-person absentee voting into the larger rotunda area of City Hall whenever high turnout requires more room.



45 Day Review and Comment Period for Community Innovation Fund

The Community Innovation Fund is intended to provide grants to neighborhood organizations to foster innovative and locally-relevant approaches to City-identified goals. Scheduled to begin in early 2015, the program will make \$300,000 available in grants to neighborhoods for a two-year period.

The draft guidelines were developed by the Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission (NCEC) after a series of nine listening sessions with neighborhood organizations held in early 2014.
